There's a youth movement afoot in painting. These 20 artists, all of whom are 40 or younger, show why realism has a strong present and a bright future.



AGE: 35 RESIDENCE: New York

BACKGROUND: "My career in art began in 1994, immediately after completing art school. I joined a small publishing company that specialized in printing limited-edition lithography.
